#### IMPORTANT EXHIBITOR INFORMATION:

- 1. Please be sure to read rules provided in the department to which you are entering. Superintendents reserve the right to disqualify an entry not meeting requirements.
- **2.** Use the provided entry form to list your projects. This will be helpful on registration day. Bring the entry form with you as you will now be entering your projects in each department separately.
- **3. Remember, changes can be made on day of entry** as to additional entries or deleting any entries on registration forms. Fill out the form on page 16.
- 4. Each Exhibitor must list the proper age/category for each exhibit. For instance we have added the category. *Professional: If you receive income in an area to which you are entering items in the open class you must enter as professional.*
- **5.** There are no entry fees for Hall of Arts and Horticulture. To ensure that we continue to offer free open class entries we ask that you *be patient* with our volunteers who want to ensure proper entry of all exhibits.
- **6. Entering animals requires a fee:** Check Open Class Livestock for information and deadlines.
- 7. When entering animals please include number of pen reservations needed.

#### REMEMBER ONLY ONE ENTRY PER LOT

The "Not listed above" or 'Not specified" lot number is only for entries not fitting into another category.

#### **ENTRY DAY PROCEDURES:**

- 1. Report to the appropriate building with your entries.
- 2. Provide entry list and pick up packet of entry tags.
- Recheck each entry tag for correct department, class and lot in each department with the department supervisor or their department volunteers.
- 4. Entries not meeting correct size/color, hanging requirements for the department will be disqualified.
- 5. Entry tags should be securely placed before leaving the exhibit to ensure tag will not be lost.
- 6. Registration MONDAY 3:00-7:00 PM
- 7. Registration closes Monday at 7:00 PM sharp.

#### **GENERAL OPEN CLASS RULES:**

- 1. All entries exhibited must be property of the person entering the items.
- 2. Items must be made, raised, or processed in the past 12 months, unless otherwise stated. Children's entries may be guided by family members.
- 3. Exhibitor can only enter one entry per lot. But in any one class, several lots can be entered.
- 4. "Not listed above" and "Not specified" lots are intended only for items not listed in other lots.
- 5. Department superintendents can make corrections as to entry placement upon judge's recommendation.
- 6. Exhibits are to be cleaned and pressed.
- 7. Fair management shall have the right to reject or remove any exhibit which it considers unfit for public viewing.
- 8. All items needing to be hung on a wall should have a proper hanger unless specified by Department rules. Items needing special care should be labeled. Living plants should have a space for watering.
- When there is one entry of a kind the judge will only award a premium if one is deserved. Any premium may be withheld at the discretion of the judge.
- 10. Judges<sup>3</sup> decisions are final with the exception of a mistake not discovered during judging time.
- 11. It is recommended that exhibitors bring a duplicate copy of entry list when claiming articles.
- 12. Articles and premiums left can be claimed in the fair office by appointment, call a board member.
- 13. The fair will not be responsible for loss of or damage to articles, but we will do everything within our power for the protection of the articles.

## **OPEN CLASS - LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS - INFORMATION - RULES & REGULATIONS**

#### Judging:

Check specific departments or schedules for times

#### LIVESTOCK BUILDING HOURS

Wednesday - Friday: 11 AM to 10 PM

Saturday: 11 AM to 6:30 PM

Release of entries is after 6:30 PM only

#### **ENTRY DAY PROCEDURES:**

- 1. Entry through west gate.
- 2. Report to main registration areas, Main Fair Office for Open Class. FFA office for FFA.
- 3. Pick up packet of pre-registered tags.
- 4. Select correct barn for your livestock.
- 5. Check with supervisor, where your pens are located.
- 6. Re-check each entry for proper department, class and lot in order to obtain a premium.
- Entry Tags should be securely placed on pen or stall to ensure tag will not be lost.

#### LIVESTOCK EXHIBIT RULES

- 1. Open class livestock exhibits accepted from all locations.
- 2. All livestock exhibited must be the property of the individual entering and must be raised in the past 12 months.
- 3. All animals must be in place at their designated times.
- 4. No premiums will be paid if livestock is removed before the regular scheduled release time.
- 4-H and FFA can enter open class with another animal not shown in either of these two areas. Animals must be registered and stall or pen fees be paid when sending in forms.
- 6. No animal can be entered as a purebred under breed classification unless and same has been recorded.
- 7. No animal unworthy of a premium shall receive one, even if there is no competition.
- Livestock which have been erroneously entered may, at the discretion of the superintendents, be transferred to their proper lots.
   During judging, a judge may also ask for transfer to the proper category.
- The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases, except if mistakes, fraud or misrepresentation not discovered at the time of judging is apparent. Then, the Board of Director's decision is final.
- 10. No animal will be awarded a premium unless promptly brought into the show ring when lot is called.
- 11. Exhibitors will provide their own bedding. They must keep their pen and stall neat, clean and open for inspection during building hours. End of fair pen/stall must be cleaned out.
- 12. Wheel barrels for waste must be emptied frequently where directed by superintendents of the department. Wheel barrels should not be over filled and do not leave in aisles. Clean-up all spills. Keep the walkways and view for visitors always pleasant.
- 13. Under no circumstances will the Faribault County Agricultural Society be responsible for any loss of damage done from an animal, and the exhibitor shall indemnify the fair and management thereof against all legal and proceedings.
- 14. Premium checks not cashed within 90 days after date of issue will be considered forfeited to fair.
- No dogs allowed in livestock buildings except those brought to children's barnyard for exhibit.
- No alcoholic beverages allowed in buildings other than specified location.

## EXHIBITION OF LIVESTOCK IN MINNESOTA REQUIREMENTS

#### **GENERAL REQUIREMENTS:**

Livestock and poultry that exhibit symptoms of any infectious or communicable disease, including ringworm and warts, may not be exhibited. All animals will be examined by the official veterinarian on the day they are admitted to the exhibition and daily during the exhibition. All animals imported into MN for exhibit must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection and satisfy Board of Animal Health importation requirements.

#### OFFICIAL IDENTIFICATION:

Please note that the following types of identification are not considered official on certificates of veterinary inspection or test records required for exhibition: 1) 4-H tags. 2) Producer tags without a state or USDA assigned premises number and individual animal number proceeded by state abbreviation. 3) Tattoos not registered with either a breed association or a state agency. #### **CATTLE**

Cattle originated from Minnesota's TB-Free Zone being exhibited in the TB Free Zone: No state requirements. For Minnesota State Fair tuberculosis testing requirements, call 651-288-4417 or visit www.mnstatefair. org

#### **SHEEP AND GOATS**

All sheep and goats, including wethers, must be identified with official identification includes USDA Scrapie identification tags and tattoos approved by the Board of Animal Health. Sheep and goats within 30 days of giving birth (before or after) cannot be exhibited without prior approval from the Board of Health.

#### HORSES

All horses must be negative to an official test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) within 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. A test is not required for suckling foals accompanying a negative dam.

#### **POULTRY**

Poultry, means turkeys, chickens (fancy Exhibition and game), water fowl and game birds, with the exception of pigeons and doves, must be individually identified with a leg or wing band and must: have had a negative test for pullorum-typhoid disease conducted within 90 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition; or originated directly from parent stock tested and found negative for pullorum-typhoid disease within the last 12 months. In addition turkeys, must have tested negative for Salmonella pallorum, Salmonella typhimurium, Mycoplasma gallisepticum, and Mycoplasma synoviae within 90 days of exhibit. Poultry must be accompanied by at testing or origination certificate approved by the Board.
